# Supporting English Language Learning (ELL) Students

# 1. Create a Welcoming Environment:

- Build Positive Relationships: Establish rapport to make ELLs feel supported.
- Respect Cultural Diversity: Appreciate and incorporate students' cultural backgrounds.

# 2. Provide Comprehensible Input:

- **Use Simple Language:** Avoid complex vocabulary and structures.
- **Visual Aids:** Use pictures, diagrams, & gestures to clarify concepts.
- Repeat and Rephrase: Reinforce understanding through repetition.

# 3. Foster Language Development:

- Language Practice: Engage students in meaningful English activities.
- Encourage Peer Interaction: Pair ELL students with English-speaking peers during group activities. This peer interaction encourages them to practice English in a natural, conversational setting.
- Model Appropriate Language Use:
   Demonstrate correct grammar,
   pronunciation, & vocabulary.

#### 4. Utilize Key Tools and Resources:

 Google Translate: Instantly translate text, images, documents, and websites. Google translate also will allow you to translate by voice when clicking the microphone button. Use sparingly for clarifying critical instructions ONLY. Do NOT translate assignments.  Have students log into their Vista Home Learning ELL Account: The Regional Office of Education (ROE) offers Vista Home Learning ELL lessons, which are excellent resources for ELL students. Encourage students to work on these lessons regularly to improve their English proficiency. Account information will be provided to teachers for students who go to the ROE.
